

## Stain Art

**Overview/Description**: Students collect different colored parts of plants in the garden and stain paper with them.

Big Idea: Art is important because it lets us be creative and successful.

Season: Summer, Fall Lesson Time: 30 minutes Grade Level: Any

Type of Activity: Art/Craft

**Materials Needed**: Table, baskets for collecting, thick paper (watercolor paper is best); fresh leaves, flowers, and berries.

**Preparation**: Do a garden walkabout ahead of time to explore and test which things in the garden give which colors, which varieties give the best results.

## What to do:

- In the Opening Circle, explain the project and that the goal is to find many different colors.
- Take a walkabout with the students with their bucket or basket to collect the staining materials (different leaves & berries, whole small flowers, beet wedges, sunflower and rose petals, dirt, grass...the more color range the better).
- Encourage the students to create a picture, not just scribbles, and have them decide what they want to create. Flowers, a sunshine, Steve the Rabbit, a person, a bee, a spider?
- Spread the materials around the table; distribute paper to each student.
- Students simply **smear**, **blot**, **press**, etc. the flowers, berries, leaves onto the paper.
- Don't forget to write names on them!

**Teaching Points**: What can dyes like these be used for? Do you think they are made with chemicals like a lot of dyes in our food and clothes? How did our clothes get to be the colors they are?

## Notes:

- You need to press/smear very hard to get the rich colors to come out. Tearing leaves sometimes helps.
- Have the kids hold a small bunch of flower petals in between their thumb and pointer finger to get a good squishy grip.
